# CONWAY CORP ANNOUNCES OPERATIONS CENTER PLANS

The Conway Corp Board of Directors recently approved plans for a new operations center to be constructed on approximately 60 acres of land on South German Lane north of Stone Dam Creek.

The new location will include a 31,000 square-foot office building, a 100,000 square-foot warehouse, a 22,500 square-foot fleet maintenance shop and covered parking for equipment and vehicles.

"In 2017 we did a master plan of our existing operations center on Harkrider Street and realized we would completely outgrow that location in 15 years," Conway Corp CEO Bret Carroll said. "To support the current growth of Conway, we need more room and storage space. With that in mind, we made the decision to begin working on a plan for a new campus with facilities and space that would meet both our current and future needs."

Nabholz Construction will break ground on the campus, designed by H+N Architects, in early 2023. The location is expected to be fully operational by the end of 2024.



## LINEWORKERS GIVE POWER TO NAVAJO NATION

With an estimated population of approximately 300,000, the Navajo Nation is the largest Native American territory in the United States – and of the 55,000 homes on the reservation, approximately 15,000 do not have electricity.

That's why the American Public Power Association and the Navajo Tribal Utility Authority are partnering with public power utilities across the country for project Light Up Navajo.

Conway Corp lineworkers Jake Ballard, Jeremy Douglas, Lance Heer, Huey King and Gordon Valentine worked 14-hour days while on the reservation to help bring electricity to the Navajo Nation, one home at a time.

Our crew ended the week powering the home of Aliza Wood, who had been waiting more than 30 years for electricity.

"It felt amazing," Wood said when she flipped the power switch for the first time. "I was like a little kid iust filled with excitement. I can see this. I can do this.

I can cook this. It just opened up the world basically."

Through the project, volunteer crews from more than a dozen public power utilities across the country have worked to build electric lines in the Navajo Nation this spring to connect more than 300 homes during the 11-week project.

"It's very humbling to be a part of this and have this experience," Underground Service Technician Gordon Valentine said. "I think we're a little spoiled. I'm getting old and I see people older than me getting electricity for the first time. It's very rewarding. It's just humbling. That's all I can say."

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## **CONWAY CORP BREAKS GROUND AT HAPPY SOLAR**

Construction has begun on a new Conway Corp Solar project located on 700 acres near Happy, Arkansas in White County.

Conway Corp entered into a purchase power agreement with Lightsource bp to develop the 132 MWdc project. Lightsource bp will finance, build, own and operate the facility and will deliver the solar energy it generates to Conway Corp under the fixed-rate power purchase agreement.

Conway Solar at Happy will supply clean energy to Conway Corp customers and will generate enough electricity to power more than 21,400 homes annually. The project will also play a role in reducing the city's carbon footprint by the equivalent of CO2 emissions from 35,270 fuel-burning cars.

"We are committed to providing safe, reliable, affordable, innovative and environmentally-sound service to our customers. This solar project checks all of those boxes," Conway Corp Chief Executive Officer Bret Carroll said. "We know this project is a great long-range strategy in our continued efforts to serve our customers with excellence."

Crews broke ground on the site earlier this year, and the project is expected to be fully operational by December 2022.

## **BOARD ELECTS GARCIA**

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## PUBLIC POWER: KEEPING POLICYMAKERS INFORMED

The public power mission is excellent. It's hard to argue with providing reliable, affordable, safe and environmentally-sustainable power. Add to this the local decision-making and provision of electricity on a not-for-profit basis, and we can all be proud to be a public power community.

We don't have customers. We have friends and family and neighbors. We're invested in Conway because we are Conway.

Part of our job is keeping your lights on, and part of our job is advocating on your behalf for policy issues that affect our community and influence our local operations.

We keep in constant contact with local, state and federal policymakers to ensure they're educated and informed. We want them to know their decisions impact our community.

Membership in advocacy organizations is key to our efforts, and we're proud members of the American Public Power Association (APPA) and the Arkansas Municipal Power Association (AMPA).

AMPA is comprised of fifteen public power utilities across the state.

Together, we have identified five main legislative issues important to our communities:



- 1. Climate policy should provide a reasonable amount of time to plan, build and amortize power plants and transmission facilities. We support environmental policy that sets clear, realistic expectations while keeping electricity affordable and reliable.
- 2. The replacement of fossil fuels with renewable electric generation will require substantial transmission investment that should be made by all stakeholders. We support policies that encourage fair and efficient transmission development as well as joint ownership of transmission and eliminating financial barriers to ownership.
- 3. Local issues like security, customer-owned generation and pole attachments are best regulated by local officials who are accountable to customers. We oppose efforts to preempt local authority over the retail and distribution-level activities of their utilities.

- 4. Access to federal tax incentives could save AMPA cities millions of dollars in energy investment. We support legislation that would allow AMPA cities access to federal tax incentives like direct payment of refundable tax credits.
- 5. In the next ten years, Arkansas will shutter 3200 MW of coal-powered generation. We support policies that promote fuel diversity, including natural gas, in electric generation.

We've been providing reliable, affordable and safe power to the Conway community for nearly 100 years. After all this time, we're still motivated by who we are and what we do for our community. We're committed to Conway – today and in the future.
